In 1998, Marty Tenenbaum was diagnosed with metastatic melanoma, a disease with a dire prognosis and no known effective therapies. He set forth on a desperate quest for the treatment that would work best for him. Ultimately, an experimental treatment saved his life.

While that treatment ultimately failed clinical testing, Marty was among the fortunate few who responded and survived. Winning that lottery only raised more questions: Why did this treatment work for him and not for others? Was response to cancer treatments more personal than generally thought, and if so, how could that response be predicted?

Could Marty's experience help similar patients find the cure they need?

As a world leader in technology development and artificial intelligence, Marty saw that countless other patients could benefit from capturing and efficiently sharing the world's collective cancer knowledge.

Our Services

When a patient registers with Cancer Commons, a team of PhD scientists and oncology experts will:

- Review their medical history and treatment goals
- Research the best diagnostic and treatment options including
 - Investigational therapies
 - Approved drugs used off label and in cocktails
 - Clinical trials
- Vet and refine options through a virtual tumor board
- Facilitate access by assisting with trial enrollment, expanded access programs, and reimbursement support
- Monitor progress over time, to update the plan and to learn

Our goal is to equip patients and their care teams with the knowledge they need to build a personalized plan of action around the best available diagnostics and treatments for their advanced cancer — all of our services are free, with the exception of some virtual tumor boards."
